CEO's Report—Doug Fee



2010 was another pivotal year for the Angus Association in Canada. The Association was not immune to the industry uncertainty. We did see a slight dip in cow numbers but not nearly as much as the reduction in commercial cow numbers both in Canada and the United States. Another of our key indicators, our registrations, were down a few hundred from 2009 but still remained strong and accounted for 56,000 of 108,000 total purebred beef cattle registrations in the country.

CanFax reports that 2010 cow numbers in Canada were down 19% from the 2005 inventory high. The number of active registered Angus cows dropped by 1.5% during the same period. You had 142,251 active registered breeding cows in 2005. In 2010, we still reported 140,049. It was a decline but nowhere near the magnitude of the industry average.

The Association's financial position remains strong. Although the yearly numbers do present a deficit, the Board of Directors consciously decided that it was better to draw on reserves for a year than to either cut services or increase fees without allowing the membership to prepare. At year end, the Association's balance sheet was still extremely strong and provides us the financial stability to remain confident and optimistic.

A significant number of members are taking advantage of the opportunity to register calves electronically in July or December at the base rate of \$15. There were 28,266 calves registered electronically during the year which accounted for 51% of all registrations. More impressive yet is the fact that 58% of all weights submitted to the Canadian Angus Performance Program came electronically. The subsidy or reduction in registration fees, depending on your viewpoint, either cost the Association or saved our members over \$120,000 during the year.

A new service introduced in 2010 allows members to store registration papers electronically in the office. We have already moved several thousand records into the electronic storage program. This eliminates the need for members to store registration papers and reduces costs both in printing and mailing from the office. Registration papers will be printed when an animal is transferred to another person not taking advantage of the electronic storage feature.

Within the pages of the report are many statistics that should be of interest. Our black-red split is about 64–36 with more black animals registered. There has been a significant drop in the use of Al and ET during the past few years which is likely a result of the current economic climate and the uncertainty felt in early 2010. Al calves accounted for 14,380 calves which is 26% of all registrations. There were only 695 ET calves which

represents 1.25% of all registrations. Our transfers favoured bull calves but not by a huge margin; 51% of transfers were bulls and 49% were females.

Our commercial outreach has as its focus adding value for our commercial customers. We were active in supporting fall feeder calf and Angus influenced sales. Our tag sales continue to grow and we continue to work with auctions, feedlots and beef marketing partners to use those tags to add value to branded Angus beef programs. The Canadian Angus Rancher Endorsed program is into its second year and has huge potential ahead of it. The major challenge reported to us by packers and feedlots is finding enough tagged animals. It's a great problem.

This will be my last annual report as your Association's Chief Executive Officer. I've spent some time going over the past 17 that were prepared for you and it is a very satisfying feeling to see the documented progress and success the breed has enjoyed during my tenure. Most of the programs offered by the Association that are taken for granted were not in place when you hired me in 1994.

We had no national Junior program, no field service, no genetic evaluations, and no money. There were serious doubts expressed by some over the decision to leave Canadian Livestock Records Corporation and bring our Registry database in house and to merge it with our performance program. It proved to be a great decision and allowed us the financial resources to expand into the successful breed Association we have today.

We've been blessed with an enthusiastic and dedicated staff. They take great pride in what they do and identify very clearly with the breed and the Association. As a group they recognize we are working for members and will go out of their way to ensure we are as member friendly as possible.

Your Directors have the responsibility to represent you all. They must look beyond the personal challenges of their own operations and set policies that benefit the Association and the breed. For the most part they have been a dedicated group. In my meetings from Doctor Alyward and Grant Wilson through to Kirk Wildman and David Bolduc there has been a generational change in leadership. With few exceptions, you have been well represented and the great majority of the 52 Board members who I have reported to did work for the best of our breed.

When I started in 1994, the Association was registering animal #780,047. For the first 89 years we had registered an average of 8,745 animals per year. Before I step aside at the end of June we will have issued registration #1,700,000. That amounts to an average of just over 54,000 registrations per year. Well over half the Angus registrations issued in Canada since 1906 were issued under my signature. It's going to be hard for my successor to maintain that momentum of growth.

As I prepare to step aside, there are many memories, some regrets, a few things that should have been done better, but all in all there is great satisfaction in knowing that I leave behind a strong Association that still has great potential for future growth.

Compte-rendu du directeur général

2010 a été une année critique pour l'Association Canadienne Angus. L'Association a été affectée par l'incertitude de l'industrie. Notre nombre de vaches a décliné un peu, mais pas au même rythme que la réduction du cheptel commercial au Canada et aux États-Unis. Un autre de nos indicateurs clés, le nombre d'enregistrements, est en baisse de quelques centaines à comparer à 2009, mais nos 56 000 enregistrements restent quand même un nombre important au niveau national, puisque toutes les races mises ensemble ont atteint 108 000 enregistrements au complet pour tout le pays.

CanFax rapporte que le nombre de vaches en 2010 au Canada étaient à la baisse de 19 % de l'inventaire reporté en 2005 au moment où il était le plus élevé. Le nombre de vaches Angus pur-sang actives a baissé de 1,5 % pendant la même période. Il y avait 142,251 vaches actives enregistrées en 2005. En 2010, les records indiquent qu'il en reste encore 140,049. C'était un déclin, mais bien loin de l'ampleur de la moyenne de l'industrie.

La situation financière de l'Association reste forte. Bien que les chiffres présentent un déficit, le Conseil d'administration a consciemment décidé qu'il valait mieux tirer des réserves pour une année au lieu de réduire les services ou augmenter les frais sans permettre aux membres de se préparer. À la fin de l'année, le bilan financier de l'association était encore très fort ce qui nous donne la stabilité financière de rester confiant et optimiste.

Un nombre important des membres profitent de l'offre d'enregistrer de leurs veaux par internet en juillet ou en décembre au tarif de base de 15 \$. Soit 28,266 veaux ont été enregistrés par voie électronique au cours de l'année ce qui représente 51 % de tous les enregistrements. Plus impressionnant encore, est le fait que 58 % de tous les poids soumis au programme de performance Angus est venu par voie électronique. La subvention ou la réduction des frais d'enregistrement, selon votre point de vue, coûte à l'Association ou permet aux membres d'épargner plus de 120 000 \$ par année.

Un nouveau service introduit en 2010 permet aux membres d'entreposer les certificats d'enregistrement par voie électronique au bureau de l'association. Nous avons déjà entreposé plusieurs milliers de records dans le programme de stockage électronique. Ceci élimine le besoin de garder les papiers d'enregistrement sous la responsabilité d'un membre et par le fait même réduit les coûts d'impression et d'envoi du bureau au membre. Les certificats seront imprimés lorsqu'un animal est transféré à une autre personne qui ne pas profite pas du service d'entreposage électronique.

Vous trouverez au long des pages du rapport annuel, de nombreuses statistiques qui devraient vous intéressées. Notre division entre les animaux noirs et les animaux rouges se tient à 64% de noirs versus 36% d'animaux rouges enregistrés. Il y a eu une baisse importante de l'utilisation de l'insémination artificielle et de la transplantation embryonnaire au cours de ces dernières années, qui est probablement le résultat du climat économique actuel et l'incertitude ressentie au début de 2010. On compte 14,380 veaux issus de l'insémination, ce qui représentant 26 % de tous les enregistrements. Il y avait seulement 695 veaux issus de la transplantation embryonnaire

ce qui représente de 1,25 % de tous les enregistrements. Nos transferts favorisaient les veaux mâles, par une marge très mince soit 51 % des transferts étaient pour des taureaux et 49 % étaient pour des femelles.

Notre approche commerciale est axée sur l'ajout de valeur pour nos clients commerciaux. Nous avons été actifs dans un rôle de soutien à chaque encan de veaux d'embouche de genre Angus durant d'automne. Nos ventes d'étiquettes continuent de croître et nous continuons de travailler avec les endroits d'encan aux enchères, les parcs d'engraissement et d'autres partenaires dans le secteur bovin à encourager l'utilisation des étiquettes Angus pour bien identifier les animaux qui peuvent pénétrer le marché de viande Angus. Le programme de viande Angus est dans sa deuxième année et représente un potentiel énorme. Le défi majeur signalé par les abattoirs et les parcs d'engraissement est d'arriver à trouver assez animaux pour rencontrer la demande. C'est un bon problème à avoir!

Ce rapport annuel sera mon dernier entant que directeur général de votre Association. J'ai pris le temps de compiler certaines réalisations au cours des 17 pour votre information et je suis très satisfait de constater les progrès documentés et le succès que la race a connu au cours de mon mandat. La plupart des programmes offerts par l'Association, qui sont aujourd'hui tenus pour acompte, n'étaient pas en place lorsque vous m'avez engagé en 1994.

Au moment de mon arrivée, nous n'avions aucun programme national junior, aucun service externe de champ, aucune évaluation génétique et pas d'argent. Il y avait des doutes sérieux exprimés par certains sur la décision de quitter la Société canadienne d'enregistrement des animaux et apporter notre base de données de registre au bureau de l'association pour une fusion avec notre programme de performance. Cela s'est avéré une très bonne décision et nous a permis les ressources financières nécessaires à l'épanouissement de l'association que nous avons aujourd'hui.

Votre conseil a la responsabilité de vous représenter tous et chacun. Ils doivent aller au-delà de leurs défis personnels de leurs propres opérations et définir des stratégies qui profitent l'Association et la race. La plupart du temps, ils ont été un groupe dédié. Tout au long des reunions du conseil, du début avec le docteur Alyward et Grant Wilson, jusqu'à Kirk Wildman et David Bolduc, il y a eu un changement de génération dans le leadership. À quelques exceptions près, vous avez été bien représentés et la grande majorité des 52 membres des conseils pour qui j'ai travaillé, avaient un but commun pour le meilleur de notre race.

Quand j'ai commencé en 1994, l'Association enregistrait l'animal # 780,047. Pendant les premières 89 années, nous enregistrions en moyenne 8,745 animaux par année. Avant ma retraite, soit à la fin de juin nous émettrons l'enregistrement # 1 700 000. Plus de 54 000 enregistrements par an en moyenne. Plus de la moitié des enregistrements d'Angus émis au Canada depuis 1906 ont été émis en vertu de ma signature. Il va être difficile pour mon successeur à maintenir cette dynamique de croissance.

Comme je me prépare à ma retraite, je me rappelle de nombreux souvenirs, avec certains regrets, certaines choses qui auraient dû être mieux faites, mais dans l'ensemble, il n'y a grande satisfaction de savoir que je laisse derrière une association solide qui a encore un grand potentiel pour une croissance future.

Notes to Financial Statements Year ended December 31, 2010

1. General:

The Canadian Aberdeen Angus Association (the "Association") is a not-for-profit organization incorporated under the Animal Pedigree Act.

The purpose of the Association is to support the development of the Angus breed through programs and strategies that emphasize the superior characteristics of the Angus breed and maintain high genetic merit and the purity of the breed.

The Association is a not-for-profit organization under the Income Tax Act and accordingly is exempt from income taxes, provided certain requirements are met.

2. Significant accounting policies:

(a) Financial instruments:

All financial instruments are initially recognized at fair value on the balance sheet date. The Association has classified each financial instrument into the following categories; held–for–trading financial assets and liabilities, loans or receivables, held–to–maturity investments, available–for–sale financial assets, and other financial liabilities. Subsequent measurement of the financial instruments is based on their classification.

Unrealized gains and losses on held–for–trading financial instruments are recognized in earnings. Gains and losses on available–for–sale financial assets are recognized in net assets and transferred to earnings when the assets are derecognized. The other categories of financial instruments are recognized at amortized cost using the effective interest rate method.

The Association has not elected to classify any financial assets or financial liabilities as held-for-trading unless they meet the held-for-trading criteria. A held-for-trading financial instrument is not a loan or receivable and includes one of the following criteria:

- (i) it is a derivative, except for those derivatives that have been designated as effective hedging instruments;
- (ii) it has been acquired or incurred principally for the purpose of selling or repurchasing in the near future; or
- (iii) it is part of a portfolio of financial instruments that are managed together and for which there is evidence of a recent actual pattern of short-term profit taking.

There are no financial assets on the balance sheet designated as held-for-trading or held-to-maturity. Cash and investments are classified as available-for-sale financial assets. All other financial assets are classified as loans or

receivables and are accounted for on an amortized cost basis. All financial liabilities are classified as other financial liabilities.

Derivative instruments are recorded on the balance sheet at fair value as required.

(b) Investments:

Investments are stated at fair value measured on a portfolio basis. They are disclosed separately from current assets to reflect the Association's intention to hold them at least throughout the following year as a reserve for unforeseen circumstances.

(c) Property and equipment:

Property and equipment is stated at cost and depreciation is provided for over the estimated useful lives of the assets, on a straight-line basis over five years.

(d) Member accounts:

Member accounts represent cash receipts received during the current year in payment of membership fees applicable to the following year and for services not yet provided.

(e) Revenue recognition:

The Association recognizes revenue for registration at the time of the registration as this is the point in time where the service is performed. Membership revenue is recognized over the period to which the membership applies. Tag revenue is recognized at the time payment is received which closely corresponds to the time of delivery. Grant revenue is recognized at the time it is received. Other services revenue is recognized at the time the service is performed.

(f) Use of estimates and assumptions:

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with Canadian generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and the disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenue and expenses during the year. Significant areas requiring the use of management estimates relate to the collectibility of accounts receivable and the useful life of property and equipment for depreciation purposes and evaluation of their net recoverable amount. Consequently, actual results could differ from those estimates.

(g) Pending accounting pronouncements

In December 2010, the Accounting Standards Board ("AcSB") released the accounting standards impacting the future financial reporting framework for not-for-profit organizations. The AcSB proposes that not-for-profit organizations

select one of the two following alternatives for financial reporting:

- (i) Accounting Standards for Not-for-Profit Organizations, or
- (ii) International Financial Reporting Standards.

These available standards are applicable to fiscal years beginning on or after January 1, 2012. Adoption of these standards is being evaluated and the impact on future financial statements is not known or reasonably estimated at this time.

3. Internally restricted funds:

In 2005 the Association's Board of Directors resolved to restrict, each year, an amount equal to 3% of that year's registration revenues, consisting of registration, memberships and transfers, until the fund reaches one year's operating costs. This resolution replaced the previous existing resolution to restrict an amount equal to 3% yearly revenue, excluding grants, to a maximum of \$1,500,000. The internally restricted amounts are not available for other purposes without the approval of the Board of Directors. During the year a resolution was passed to dispense with the current year restriction and to transfer \$145,500 from the future development fund to unrestricted net assets.

5. Canadian Angus Foundation Inc.:

The Canadian Angus Foundation Inc. (the "Foundation") is incorporated, as a corporation without share capital, under the Canada Corporations Act. The Foundation operates to receive donations for purposes of funding scholarships and the preservation of Association archives. The Foundation is a registered charity under the Income Tax Act and accordingly is exempt from income taxes, provided certain requirements are met.

The Association exercises control over the Foundation by virtue of its ability to appoint a majority of the voting members of its Board of Directors. The accounts of the Foundation have not been consolidated in these financial statements. Unaudited financial statements of the Foundation as at December 31, 2010 and 2009 are available to the members of the Association and are summarized as follows:

In accordance with donor imposed restrictions, \$82,518 (2009–\$13,986) of the Foundation's assets are to be used to provide scholarships to junior candidates. A further \$27,950 (2009–\$27,950) of the Foundation's assets are subject to donor imposed restrictions that they be maintained for a period of not less than ten years, after which time the funds are to be used towards meeting the goals and projects of the Foundation as established under its constitution, including support for junior members, archiving of records and memorabilia for posterity and education and research. These externally restricted contributions have been deferred and are recognized in revenue when the contributed funds are spent on the program to which they are restricted. Investment income earned on these funds can be used at any time, at the discretion of the Foundation.

7. Capital disclosures:

The Association's capital is its net assets which consist of its investment in property and equipment and its internally restricted and unrestricted net assets.

The Association manages capital using annual budgeting and long-range plans. Management uses these plans to ensure adequate capital is on hand to meet current and future capital requirements.

8. Risk management:

The Association is exposed to a number of financial risks in the normal course of its business operations, including market risk, interest rate risk, credit risk, liquidity risks and commodity price risk.

(a) Market risk:

Market risk is the risk of potential loss resulting from the fluctuations in the fair value of financial instruments. The objective of management is to manage market risk within acceptable parameters while optimizing the return on risk. The Association's strategy is to invest primarily in high quality government and corporate bonds and debentures with varying maturities and assesses market risk as low.

(b) Interest rate risk:

A large portion of the Association's investments are held in fixed rate government bonds and corporate debentures with maturities varying from 2014 through 2019 and high interest mutual funds. Fluctuations in interest rates do not have an immediate impact on the Association's operations, however, a prolonged decline in the rate of interest inherent in investments held by the Association of one percentage point would reduce the Association's interest revenue by approximately \$12,700 (2009–\$11,000).

(c) Credit risk:

The Association is exposed to credit risk from counterparties being unable to fulfil their obligations. The Association manages risk through various internal processes including credit policies and limits, credit checks and experience. There is no significant concentration of credit risk with any one party as at December 31, 2010.

(d) Liquidity risk:

Liquidity risk is the risk that the Association will encounter difficulties in meeting its financial liabilities when they come due. The Association manages liquidity risk by forecasting cash flows to identify liquidity requirements, monitoring activity levels which affect cash flow while maintaining adequate cash balances to cover daily operating expenses and investing surplus cash balances in such a manner to provide longer term liquidity.

(e) Commodity price risk:


Fluctuations in the market for cattle may impact on producers' decisions to register livestock which would reduce the Association's registration revenues and thereby limit operations. The Association mitigates this risk through the active promotion of the Angus breed.



Saskatchewan

2010 was another successful year for the Saskatchewan Angus Association with memberships and registrations staying at a steady level.

Our main promotion to our membership and commercial producers remains our newsletter 'The Angus Edge'. We publish three issues a year and it is mailed to approximately 2,500 producers, mostly in Saskatchewan. Directors or CAA staff were in attendance at every Canadian Angus Rancher Endorsed Saskatchewan feeder calf sale barn at least once in the fall to promote the program and coffee and doughnuts were sponsored at many of the sales as well.

Our Saskatchewan Junior Association remains strong and they held another successful summer show in conjunction with our summer Gold Show in Prince Albert in August. Two \$500 scholarships were awarded to junior members Alyssa Anderson and Katie Olynyk in November. We also continued our 4-H program where a promotional item is given to each 4-H member showing Angus animals at the local level and champions and reserves at Regionals were also given Champion awards.

The Canadian Western Agribition Angus Shows and the Masterpiece Sale were once again a highlight with strong numbers in the show, on par with previous years, and the Masterpiece average was again well over \$4,000, however, on a few less lots than in previous years. The commercial barn at the show was full of Angus influence cattle and the majority of the bred females were bred Angus as well, with the majority of the winning and top selling pens being Angus.

Our 2010 Commercial Producer of the year was Trevor & Sarah Doerksen and family of Herbert, Saskatchewan, the 2010 Breeder of the Year was Howe Red Angus, Moose Jaw, SK and the Honourary Saskatchewan President was John Willmott of Pense, SK.

Manitoba

The Manitoba Angus Association and its breeders have completed another successful year in spite of the many commercial breeders and a few large purebred breeders getting out of the business. The Association is looking forward to an even better year with cattle prices higher in all categories.

January started off with our annual meeting with a smaller turnout, but some very good discussions on a variety of topics. Our largest event in January is Ag Days where we set up the booth. There was plenty of interest in the Canadian Angus Rancher Endorsed tag program and many taking herd directories for future reference when searching for their next Angus

bull or some Angus cows. Thank you to Lyall Edgerton for his time dedicated to working the booth.

February saw our first of three issues of the Manitoba Angus Outlook go out. The newsletter has continued to be well received and proves to be a good venue for informing the membership.

The bull sales in Manitoba were good and board members took turns attending as many as possible to talk to people about the Canadian Angus Rancher Endorsed tag program.

This past May the MAA took on a new project and invited Brian Good to attend two meetings in Manitoba to present information about the Canadian Angus Rancher Endorsed tag program. The meetings were held at auction marts. Commercial and purebred breeders were invited as well as feedlot operators and auction mart owners from all over Manitoba. The meetings were held in Brandon and Ashern and were well attended by both commercial and purebred producers. The MAA felt this was a step in the right direction and would like to attempt more information sessions in the future.

The Association once again handed out 4-H tokens to members showing an Angus cross animal as their 4-H project. The numbers had dropped by approximately 17% and this seemed to be consistent with other breeds in Manitoba as well. We feel this is a result of reduced number of commercial cattle herds.

In June the 1st Manitoba Angus Field Day was held at the DJ Cattle Co. farm near Brookdale, MB. There were quite a few pens of cattle from various parts of Manitoba and a crowd of around 90 people enjoyed viewing the cattle, having a good visit and a BBQ supper.

At our annual Maritime meeting in December we celebrated a successful "Angus year' in all three Maritime provinces. Our new executive is again truly Maritime with Trevor Welch of NB as President, Julie Mutch of PEI as vice president and Betty Lou Scott of NS as Secretary-Treasurer.

Canadian Red Angus Promotion Society

The past year has been another success; the current board was able to capitalize on the experience of our existing directors and blend it well with the new ideas and enthusiasm of the new directors.

Under the guidance of Dave Longshore as Vice President and Red RoundUp Chairman, the 38th Annual Canadian Red RoundUp was a recordable success. In an effort to keep the event fresh and entertaining, the Board worked diligently with Bryan and Sherry from Mackenzie Sales

Management to bring in fresh ideas and events. Saturday's sale marked successful for consignors and purchasers alike, with a sale average comparable to previous years. 




Lybrook Miller Scholarship (Alberta) 2010 winner: Valentina Gabert

2010 winner: Morgan Ings


Value: \$500

Criteria: A \$500 scholarship is available to a young Maritime breeder each year. The scholarship quidelines are:

- 1. Applicants must be a member of both the Canadian Junior Angus Association (or Canadian Angus Association depending on age) and the Maritime Junior Angus Association (if still eligible) and dues must be paid at time of application.
- 2. Applicants must have successfully completed at least one semester of post-secondary study and submit a copy of their most recent transcript of marks.
- 3. Applicants must be under 25 years of age and a resident of the Maritime provinces.
- 4. One scholarship of \$500 will be awarded per year.
- 5. Applicants may reapply if they were unsuccessful with their first application, but each applicant may only receive one award.
- 6. Completed applications must include (1) a transcript of the most recent marks, (2) a recent head and shoulders photo (to be used for announcement of the winner), (3) the reference information sheet, (4) a completed application form, and (5) the required essay. An interview may be required.

Selection will be based on (1) involvement with the Angus breed, (2) academics, (3) involvement in the cattle industry and the community.

In 1993 the Canadian Angus Foundation began. Now, 18 years later, we look back at our initiatives and successes to date. In 2009, Canada hosted a very successful World Angus Forum that added financially to the Canadian Angus Foundation. Since the Forum we directors have been seeking new, innovative ways to fundraise.

The four main areas of focus for the Foundation are historical preservation, youth development, education and research. We made great strides in 2010 by cataloguing many breed artifacts in our possession and storing the more fragile documents in a climate-controlled facility at the Glenbow Museum archives in Calgary.

There were two additional significant initiatives in 2010. We created and distributed a donation envelope. Notes to Financial Statements

Year ended December 31, 2010

1. General:

Canadian Angus Foundation Inc. (the "Foundation") is incorporated, as a corporation without share capital, under the Canada Corporations Act. It operates to receive donations for purposes of funding scholarships and the preservation of the archives of the Canadian Aberdeen Angus Association (the "Association"). The Foundation is a registered charity under the Income Tax Act and accordingly is exempt from income taxes, provided certain requirements are met. The Foundation is controlled by the Association by virtue of the Association's ability to appoint a majority of the voting members of the Board of Directors.

2. Significant accounting policies:

(a) Revenue recognition:

The Foundation follows the deferral method of accounting for revenue. Restricted contributions, such as grants and donations designated for a specific purpose are recognized as revenue in the period in which the related expenses are incurred. Unrestricted contributions, such as grants and donations not designated for a specific purpose are recognized as revenue when received or receivable if the amount can be reasonably estimated and collection is reasonably assured.

(b) Deferred contributions:

Externally restricted contributions are recognized as revenue when the contributed funds are spent on the program to which they are restricted.

(c) Administration support services:

The Foundation relies on the Association for administrative support services for which no charges are made and no amounts are recognized in these financial statements.

(d) Use of estimates:

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with Canadian generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and the disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenue and expenses during the year.

3. Deferred contributions:

(a) The Dorothy Banks Scholarship Fund:

The Dorothy Banks Scholarship Fund was established by the Foundation in co-operation with the Dorothy Banks Scholarship Committee to provide

scholarships to junior candidates. The Foundation grants scholarships using contributions received explicitly for this purpose.

(b) The Norm Wade Scholarship Fund: Following the death of Norm Wade, the British Columbia Angus Association started the Norm Wade Scholarship Fund within the Canadian Angus Foundation to provide scholarships to junior candidates.

(c) Enduring Property Investment Fund:

The Enduring Property Investment Fund was established by the Foundation in 2009 as a way for donors to contribute funds dedicated for the long-term vision of the Foundation. Contributions are to be held by the Foundation for a duration of not less than 10 years, after which time the funds are to be used toward meeting the goals and projects of the Foundation as established under its constitution, including support for junior members, archiving of records and memorabilia for posterity and education and research. Investment income earned on the funds can be used at any time, at the discretion of the Foundation.

(d) Dick Turner Scholarship Fund:

The scholarship was established in July of 2010 shortly after the passing of Dick Turner. The parameters of how the funds will be dispersed have not been set, although they will be directed toward youth development.

(e) Canadian Junior Angus Association Scholarship This scholarship fund was included in the Foundation beginning in 2010. This was done in an effort to maximize the return on investment through consolidation. The process for dispersing funds will remain unchanged unless directed by the Canadian Junior Angus Association.

5. Capital disclosures:

The Foundation's capital is its net assets. The Foundation manages capital using annual budgeting and long-range plans. Management uses these plans to ensure adequate capital is on hand to meet current and future capital requirements.

2010 Provincial Honourary Presidents

Lorraine Wade Coldstream, British Columbia

The BC Angus Association is delighted to nominate Lorraine Wade as Honourary President this year. Lorraine was born in Maple Ridge, BC but she spent much of her early life in Saskatchewan. When she finished school, she enlisted. After her service in the army, Lorraine enrolled at UBC. It was during a summer job at Aspen Grove General Store that she met Norm. Norm and Lorraine were married in 1949 and lived at Aspen Grove. They had a sawmill operation and some commercial cattle. Lorraine spent many hours minding the ranch and raising their two children Eric and Karen while Norm logged and ran the saw mill. Aspen Grove was rather isolated and eventually they moved to Coldstream where they raised only purebred Angus cattle. Kalamal Angus became a well respected herd name.

Norm had many business interests which took him away from home, so it was left to Lorraine and the children do a lot of the hands-on work with the cattle. In later years they travelled together throughout North America stopping at many stock yards and cattle shows and visiting ranches all across the continent. It was Lorraine who kept the records of the hundreds of "Norm Wade" halters that were distributed to 4-H members and youngsters showing Angus cattle. One could always call on Lorraine to find out who had placed in each class. To this day Lorraine continues to maintain an interest in the efforts of our young Angus breeders by supporting the GOAL conference and maintaining the Norm Wade trophy at Williams Lake. Lorraine still attends many Angus events and it is always a pleasure to see her. Her son Eric said "mom and dad were quite a pair". It was Lorraine who made it possible for Norm to do what he did for the Angus Association. Thank you Lorraine.

Wayne Robinson Mossleigh, Alberta

Alberta Angus Association is proud to name Wayne Robinson our Honourary President. Wayne has been an active Angus breeder since 1956 at Mossleigh, AB. He showed Angus calves in 4-H in the late 1950s and, together with Rob Mathews under the mentorship of Don Mathews, Highland Stock Farms, Wayne would become a very active Angus breeder. While the herd was predominantly commercial for a few years in the late 1960s, Blind Creek Farms become very active in the early 1970s, and it was during this time that Wayne would become a significant contributor to Angus politics and volunteerism. Wayne has been part of the Calgary Bull Sale, the PNE, the legendary Cross-Country and Superstar sales, Agribition and the Alberta Angus Association as a volunteer and Director. Further, he has been involved with the Calgary Stampede for decade after decade, including as Chairman of the Beef Cattle Committee. Wayne was the Chairman of the Alberta Angus Association in 1980. He has shown cattle and assisted those who want to become part of the Angus industry every step of the way.

Terry Moneo—Peak Dot Ranch Wood Mountain, Saskatchewan

Our purebred herd began 50 years ago with the purchase of 30 females from Eugene Schillinger of Circle, Montana.

At an early age I was taught that your cow herd is a factory and that you have to use great herd bulls. One of these bulls, Banner, was purchased from Jack Davidson of Misty Moor Farms at Pontiex. We paid \$4,000 for a ½ interest... a ridiculous price at that time. He built us a cow herd with his females.

The first sale we marketed bulls at was in Val Marie where I competed with a young lad named Bob Switzer. We traded Grand Champion ribbons at that sale for years. Bulls were also marketed through sales in Regina, Weyburn, Assiniboia, Moose Jaw and Swift Current.

When the trend changed to larger cattle we bought a bull from C.K. Armistad... Bonnie Chance Bardolene 10A... which we nicknamed Snako. He increased our cow herd size from 900–1,000 pounds to 1,200–1,500 pounds. Don Currie bought him and years later he is still using him and raising great cattle. A son of Snako, the Reserve Junior Champion at the Regina Bull Sale, set a record selling to Bill Dillabaugh of Double AA for \$6,000.

In the early 70s, a time when Angus were not popular, Bill and I started one of the first large Angus bull sales in Canada, selling 150 bulls and 100 replacement females here at the ranch. At this time I was a director of the

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Saskatchewan Angus Association. Highlights of these years include a trip to the Stock Show in England, starting the first Angus feeder sales and representing the Association on the Saskatchewan Stock Growers board. After we dissolved our bull sale partnership with Double AA we held several successful bull sales in Chinook, Montana. We also sold 90 bulls privately to Jim Welch (husband of actress Raquel Welch). This was the largest one-time sale we ever had.

We showed cattle at the Toronto Royal, Denver Stock Show, Billings NILE, Brandon, Edmonton Farmfair and of course Agribition which we won two years in a row with a bull called Turbulance.

Together with Six Mile Ranch we have hosted two successful Cattlemen's Weekends which included bus tours, guest speakers, cattle displays and entertainment.

Sales are held at the ranch in April and December. Cattle sell all over North America and embryos and semen to other countries as well.

We have welcomed visitors from Canada, the U.S., Great Britain, Russia, New Zealand and Australia.

We make our living strictly on cattle and the old saying "just hang on to the cow's tail and she will pull you through" is certainly true. Last year we registered 985 Angus calves.

Fifty years in the Angus business and my involvement in 4-H, the Saskatchewan Angus Association and the Saskatchewan Stock Growers Association has been the basis of many lifelong friendships. The cattle have brought all three of my children and their families home to be a part of the ranch. I am a very lucky guy. Nothing gives me more pleasure than to see nine or ten saddle horses unloaded out of a trailer and my children and grandchildren riding off to round up the herd. It is the Angus cattle that keeps us together and happy.

Vaughan Greenslade—Kinared Stock Farm Portage La Prairie, Manitoba

I got started in the Angus business in my youth as a 4-H member in the Portage 4-H beef club in the late 1950s. My father, Elmer Greenslade, gave

me calves and the proceeds from the sale of these calves were used to pay for my university education. I got a degree in Agriculture from the University of Manitoba in 1969, specializing in Animal Science. After finishing university, I started farming with my father raising Black Angus cattle and grain farming. My father and I farmed together until the mid 1970s when my father retired from the farm. My brother John came back to the farm in the mid-1970s and he and I farmed together operating a feedlot until 1980 when interest rates forced us to shut down the feedlot and the farm.

I went to work for Manitoba Agriculture as a professional agrologist but was able to farm in a small way; retiring after 22 years. Starting in 1986, Red Angus cattle have been very good to us until BSE hit. We dispersed our herd in December 2010 but still have about 40 old cows and bulls to sell for the next couple of years.

My father was President of the CAA Board in the mid 1960s; and I was the provincial rep on the Canadian Red Angus Promotion Society and then President of CRAPS in 2010. We were very pleased in 2006 when the Canadian Angus Association presented our family with a plaque recognizing 50 years of registering Angus cattle. I received a pin recognizing my father as honourary president, after his death in 1993. I am honoured to be able to walk in my father's footsteps. Thank you to the Manitoba Angus Association for the nomination as an honourary president for 2011.

Jeff "Butch" Bailey Perth, Ontario

Butch Bailey was very influential to the Angus industry, introducing many new breeders into the industry. He was an Angus enthusiast all his life. He was a Director and Past President of the Ottawa Valley Angus Association as well as the Eastern Ontario Angus Association. He was a director and Past President of the Ontario Angus Association. Over the years Butch had successfully shown and promoted Angus cattle throughout Canada from coast to coast.

John Donaldson—JD Farms West Bolton, Quebec

John was born in Montreal in 1935 and attended school there including MacDonald College, the Agricultural School of McGill University. His father, Jack, purchased the first family farm in Hudson, Quebec. A neighbour had a top herd of Holsteins and was a pioneer in the use of artificial insemination. John's interest in bovine genetics grew from watching his neighbour's selective breeding. He worked on dairy farms in Ontario in the summers of his youth until his father purchased John's current farm located in the Eastern Townships of Quebec in 1956. Jack Donaldson started the Black Angus herd in 1957 and it has been an Angus farm continuously. The farm house in West Bolton is now over 200 years old and the farm has been the venue for many Angus events over the years.

John left to work in the business world in Western Canada for many years. In 1996, John and his wife, Donna, took over the farms and revived the herd with an infusion of excellent genetics from across North America. John enthusiastically researched and analyzed worldwide genetics and with the utilization of AI breeding and EPD reports, he indulged his passion to constantly improve his herd genetics along with diligently maintaining herd health. His Angus EPDs have been the highest in Canada and he has sold hundreds of "JD" bulls in Quebec.

John was the Quebec Director on the Canadian Angus Association Board beginning in 2007. He was honoured to be elected President of the Canadian Angus Association and served during the World Angus Forum at Spruce Meadows.

In the fall of 2009, John and Donna dispersed the JD Farms herd of over 100 cows. They kept only one bred heifer to keep Donna's elderly pet Jersey cow company. In a couple of months, John could not justify only having one Angus and he began assembling a small herd. He very selectively breeds and flushes these cows and has promised Donna that the herd will remain small so that they can spend time at their other home on Vancouver Island where he succumbs to his other passion, salmon fishing.

John has been the recipient of the award for the Top Performing Farm of all Breeds, Commercial or Purebred in Quebec as well as the winner of many ribbons banners and trophies from Alberta to the Maritimes including Supreme in many of these shows.

Fred Welch— Garvie Farms Glassville, New Brunswick

Fred Welch, born May 31, 1942, grew up in Glassville, New Brunswick on his parents' small mixed dairy farm. He attended high school at Florenceville Regional High.

Fred received his teacher's certificate in 1961 and started teaching immediately in various locations before settling in Florenceville and teaching at the Florenceville Regional High School. Fred finished out his teaching career at Carleton North Senior High School in Bristol. He was also heavily involved in the local community serving on the Florenceville Village council, not only as councilor but as mayor for many years. He also served on the local hospital board, for the Bath Hospital.

Farming has always been a part of his life, not only growing up, but not long after starting his teaching career, he purchased some Angus cattle that he kept on his parents' farm in Glassville. He joined the Canadian Angus Association in 1974 and has been involved with various committees and events within the New Brunswick Angus Association ever since.

He was actively involved with showing steers and the Carleton County Spring Show and Sale in the late 1970s and into the 1980s. His son, Trevor Welch, also showed steers and heifers in the local 4-H club during his time in high school.

A highlight of Fred's Angus involvement was hosting the annual Maritime Angus Field Day in 1987, which was a huge success, and everyone present was able to enjoy some Carleton County hospitality.

Since retiring from teaching in 1995, he now resides in the same house and on the same farm that his parents lived on. He is still actively involved in raising approximately 20 head of purebred Black Angus cattle, with his son Trevor and grandson Taylor, who also now live on the farm property.

Long-Term Recognition

In 1998, the Canadian Aberdeen Angus Association instituted a long-term recognition award to recognize those individuals and families that have demonstrated a long-time commitment to the Angus breed in Canada by maintaining a continuous membership in the Association for at least 50 years. In 2011, the award program was expanded to recognize families with 75 and 100 continuous years of membership.

To date, 121 Angus families have been recognized for 50 years of continuous service. In 2011, we are pleased to recognize the following Angus families for commitment to the breed:
